## Musings of a Preacher

### **Straight to the Point**

While working for a daily newspaper, I found one thing editors did with the page format could also be applied to preparing my sermons. For instance, after placing the desired articles on a page, especially page 1, there would remain a small hole or two. These holes had to be filled with something.

One way to fill the empty space, was to take the first paragraph of a wire story (Associated Press, e.g.) and put a small heading on it. This method worked. Why? Because articles were written with all the pertinent information in the first paragraph. The remainder of the article spelled out the details.

#### **LESSON LEARNED**

The lesson I learned was to "set the scene" at the beginning of a sermon. Doing so puts both the speaker and the listener "on the same page." The points made in a brief introduction become the outline for the body. The conclusion would restate what was contained in the introduction.

As a result the lessons were orderly and complete. No fluff (i.e., interesting but not pertinent information).
